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


Agriculture Policy

Her dissertation, *Reconciling Conflicting Institutional Logics: Community Reinvestment Officers at the Intersection of Public Policy and Market Forces,* examined the multiple conflicting field-level institutional logics that private sector managers must reconcile between the demands of public policy with their market driven missions.

Immediately upon graduation Dr. Adkins continued working as the Director for Northwest Arkansas Industry and Community Engagement for the Division of Economic Development at the UA where she had been recognized by community awards such as Celebrate Arkansas' Ones to Watch in 2022. However, it didn't take long for Dr. Adkins to find her true calling. She states, "Obtaining my doctorate opened up a new career opportunity for me, as I was hired as an Assistant Research Professor by the Institute for Integrative and Innovative Research (I³R) in January of this year. I³R is a translational research institute. Our mission is to pioneer solutions to wicked problems through convergence research across academic, industry, government, and non-profit sectors to make a positive societal impact by creating and deploying innovations to scale." By working at the Institute, she is able to combine her interests in economic development and community engagement with the institution's priorities of innovation and entrepreneurship to create a positive societal impact. She is currently the principal investigator on a National Science Foundation Convergence Accelerator grant funded study involving the transformation of Artificial Intelligence (AI) powered data to make it more accessible to smaller businesses.

Dr. Adkins gives a lot of the credit for her current success to the Public Policy program, "I would absolutely not be in the position that I am in without the PUBP program." Speaking with mentors and faculty throughout the program helped her to realize that her passion was to make a tangible posi-

Dr. Houpert's dissertation titled "Decision Making Under Uncertainty Among Agricultural Commodity Traders" consists of three articles that explore the complex reasons for commodity traders to engage in so-called forward transactions. The first part explores if traders are able to perform consistently, while the second section investigates if either the length of a forward contract or the price basis influences decision making. The third section takes a look at the importance of public information for agricultural producers to sell or for commercial traders to buy a commodity. The findings demonstrate that under certain conditions some traders are able to perform consistently and that at high price levels, traders engage in shorter transactions. Public information is used by buyers and sellers to inform their decisions. These results may support policymakers in allocating financial resources efficiently while supplying public information and supporting efficient markets.

Gwen Arnold (UC-Davis), Melissa Merry (Louisville), Aaron Smith-Walter (Massachusetts Lowell), and Holly Peterson (LSU) as well as managing Editor, Dr. Creed Tumlinson (Cal State Bakersfield); the editorial associates and assistants are MPA and Public Policy PhD students.

Ben Galloway and Victor Kwaku Akakpo, who are both Public Policy Ph.D. students at U of A, play a vital role in ensuring that the manuscripts submitted to the journal meet the author guidelines. This involves processing new manuscripts and checking for adherence to these guidelines. They provide support across a range of activities, including project management, impact factor analysis, generating special collections, and fact-checking on issues.

The journal staff shared their perspective on the benefits of being involved with such a prestigious journal. Not only are they building editorial skills and the obvious benefit of being able to put their contributions on their resumes, working on the journal has also brought many other benefits. Camille was first to note the benefits of having a "behind the scenes" look at the whole publication system. Izehi added that it has demystified both the writing and the submission process as well as humanized some of those authors that have been required reading in classes. Additionally, Morgan noted the advantage of having early access to the latest articles that she could leverage for her own research interests.

Working on the journal has also provided what Dr. Song referred to as a 'hidden curriculum', providing an education on things that are not often brought up in the classroom. Nataliia spoke of the importance of journal choice when submitting a manuscript and how that had never really crossed her mind prior to her work on the journal when she stated, "Sometimes we get great articles, but they don't fit the mission of the journal, so we have to look for something else." Camille revealed that she is interested to see how her exposure to so many varied articles outside the classroom will impact her ability to read and analyze research over time.

opportunities. They have developed a community amongst themselves, as well as with university faculty, and they also get to work with the associate editors at other universities across the country. As Ben noted, "I get to network outside of the university when I go to conferences. I get to attend the *PSJ* reception and hang out with the other editors and meet other people through them." Izehi added, "We get to see ourselves in different spaces with other people in the whole of academia and see how we measure up in such a space."

The *PSJ* will not only be a benefit to those who are part of the Staff but will also be a benefit to the
